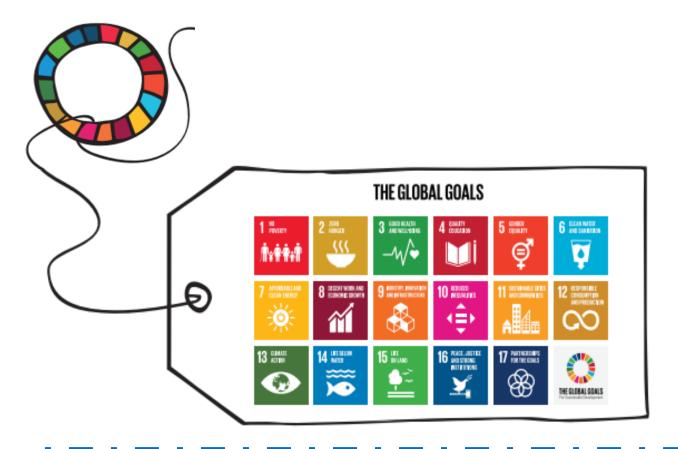












In 2015, leaders from the 193 countries of the United Nations met to discuss the world's problems and agreed on a plan to tackle them by the year 2030. They named this plan the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), also known as the Global Goals. The Global Goals are the most ambitious agreement that world leaders have ever made. They cover everything from health and education to peace and justice. They are a universal call of action to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure that by 2030 all people enjoy peace and prosperity.

Children's Mental Health Week: Dr Ranj's top tips for mental health in school

1. Get a good night's sleep

Sleep is when our bodies and our brains recover. It's when our brains sort out information that we've taken in during the day and process

2. Get outside and active

Exercise and physical activity aren't just good for our bodies, they are good for our brains as well. Exercise makes our bodies produce happy hormones, which have chemicals which help us to feel good.

3. Feed your mind

Our brains need energy too! Eating lots of different things of different colours and drinking lots of fluids too helps to keep your brain ticking over and your mind working better.

4. Speak up

If you're struggling, feeling down or worried about something then find a trusted grown-up you can speak to about it.

Asking questions can get you the answers you need, but just talking can also make you feel better.

5. Look out for each other

Being kind to one another not only helps us feel good about ourselves, but it's also beneficial to our mental health. So another reason to be sociable and be friendly!

Our third focus will be decided by the green team this week so Watch Out!



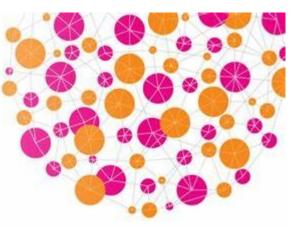
### Top Tip

# British Science Week 2022





Our parent steering group took part in a Now Press Play activity where they used the headphones to listen to a science experience based on growing plants.

This links to our Sustainable Global Goal of 'Life on Land'.



Year 6 built nests to explore how penguins survive in harsh weather conditions and how their nests are designed to be weather resistant.

They used a range of materials to design them and tested them using water to act as rainfall.

This was linked to the sustainable development goal of 'Life on Land'.











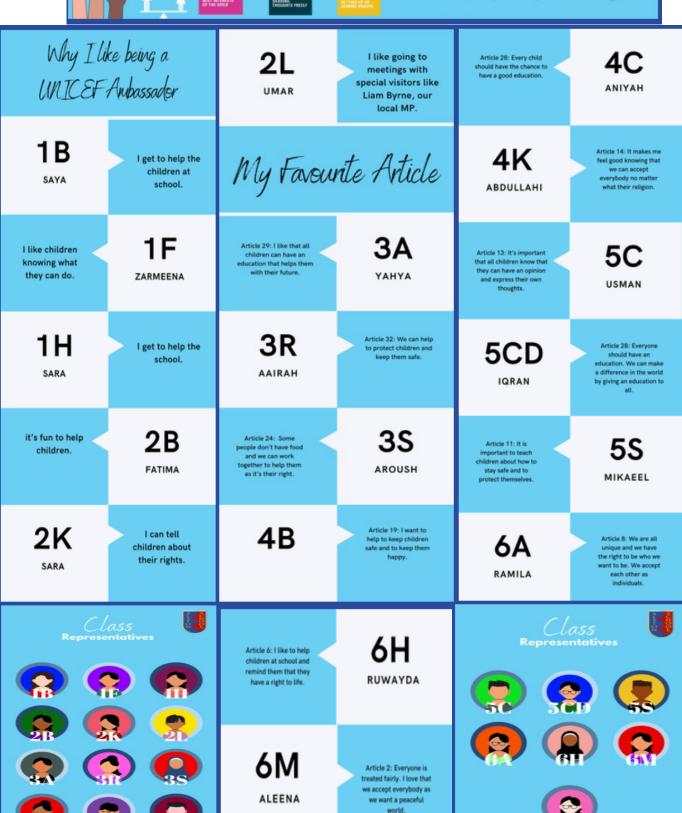


Year 4 visited an outdoor gym to explore the importance of physical exercise for growth and development.
