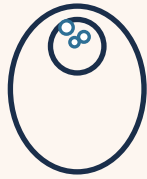

Smegma Pearls ♥

"Doctor, white-white kuch hai!" — Relax, parent.



Dead skin cells —
not pus, not infection!

🔪 WHAT IT ACTUALLY IS

Smegma pearls are small, firm, whitish-yellow lumps that form **under the foreskin** in baby boys. They're made of dead skin cells and natural secretions — a completely normal part of how the foreskin separates from the glans over time.



It IS

- Normal physiological smegma buildup
- A sign that natural separation is happening
- Painless, harmless, temporary



It is NOT

- Pus or infection
- A cyst or tumour
- A hygiene failure on your part



The Verdict: Do Nothing.

Don't squeeze it, don't dig it out, don't panic-Google it at 1am. It resolves on its own as the foreskin separates naturally — usually over months to a few years.

DADI-NANI MYTH PATROL

"Isko nikaalna padega warna andar hi sad jayega!" — No. Forcing it out causes pain and tiny tears. It comes out on its own, on baby's own timeline.

Phimosis 🗝️

The tight foreskin that's (usually) just... not ready yet.



Tight at birth =
normal, not a problem

🔧 WHAT IT ACTUALLY IS

Phimosis = the foreskin can't be pulled back over the glans. In babies and toddlers, this is the **default setting**, not a defect. The foreskin and glans start off fused and separate naturally — usually by age 5, sometimes later.



Physiological (normal)

- Present since birth
- No pain, no ballooning that hurts
- Pees just fine
- **Action: wait it out**



Pathological (watch out)

- Develops later, was retractable before
- Scarred, whitish ring at tip
- Recurrent infections / painful peeing
- **Action: see a doctor**



The Verdict: Patience First.

Most physiological phimosis resolves with age — no surgery needed. If it doesn't, a topical steroid cream resolves the majority of remaining cases without surgery at all.

DADI-NANI MYTH PATROL

"Thoda zor lagao, khul jayega!" — Please, no. Forceful retraction tears delicate skin and can actually cause scarring that makes things worse, not better.

Hypospadias 🩺

The **ONE** thing on this list actually worth checking early.



Opening **NOT** at tip —
check this early

🔍 WHAT IT ACTUALLY IS

Hypospadias is when the urinary opening sits **somewhere other than the tip** of the glans — underneath, on the shaft, or lower. It affects roughly 1 in every 200 baby boys, making it far more common than most parents realise.



3 Signs to Spot

- Urine opening not at the tip
- Downward curve of the penis (chordee)
- Foreskin looks "hooded" — full on top, missing underneath



Do NOT Do This

- Don't circumcise before a specialist check
- Surgeons often use that exact foreskin tissue for repair
- Removing it early = harder fix later



The Verdict: See a Doctor (Don't Panic).

It's surgically correctable with high success rates. Ideal repair window is 6-18 months — so early spotting genuinely helps.

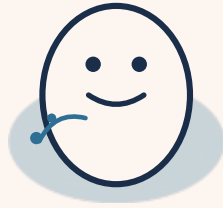
DADI-NANI MYTH PATROL

"Chota sa fark hai, theek ho jayega apne aap!" — This one's the exception on the list. This is worth an actual doctor visit, not a "wait and see."

Cleaning 101 🧼

The bath-time mistakes almost every household makes.



✓ DO THIS

- 💧 Warm water only, outside of the foreskin
- 👉 Let nature do the separating — no rushing
- 👨‍⚕️ If it doesn't retract by school age, ask your doctor about it — don't force it yourself

✗ NEVER DO THIS

- 🚫 Force the foreskin back to "clean inside"
- 🧼 Soap or shampoo inside the foreskin
- 🧻 Cotton swabs, Dettol, or Savlon down there



The Whole Rule, In 5 Words:

"Warm water. Outside. That's it." Nothing about a baby's foreskin needs scrubbing, soap, or "going inside" until it separates on its own.

DADI-NANI MYTH PATROL

"Andar tak saaf karna padega, warna infection ho jayega!" — Soap and forced cleaning *INSIDE* is actually what causes the irritation everyone's trying to prevent.

Should I Panic? 📱

A parent's emergency decision cheat-sheet.



Chill, totally normal

- White lumps under foreskin (smegma pearls)
- Foreskin won't retract in a baby/toddler
- Ballooning during peeing, no pain
- Foreskin slightly red after a long day in a wet diaper



See a doctor

- Urine opening not at the tip / curved penis
- Foreskin that WAS retractable, now suddenly isn't
- Pain, swelling, fever, or foul discharge
- A previously normal-looking penis that suddenly looks different

📞 Book a visit immediately if you see:

- ⚠️ Fever along with redness or swelling
- 😭 Crying specifically during urination
- 🩸 Any bleeding or open sore
- 🚽 Inability to urinate at all

💬 One sentence to remember from each chapter

- ☐ **Pearls:** dead skin, not pus — leave it alone
- ☐ **Phimosis:** tight is normal in babies — patience over force
- ☐ **Hypospadias:** opening not at the tip = worth checking early
- ☐ **Cleaning:** warm water, outside only, nothing more
