DESCRIPTION/ISSUE

On March 5, 2020, Lawrence Hogan, Jr., Governor of Maryland issued a proclamation declaring a state of emergency and existence of a catastrophic public health emergency due to the novel coronavirus which can cause the respiratory disease COVID-19.

Expedited Bill 17-20 would suspend the imposition of the carryout bag tax until 15 days after the conclusion of the Maryland state of emergency. Within 7 days after the state of emergency ceases, Bill 1720 would require the County Executive to notify retail establishments and the public of the date on which the imposition of the carryout bag tax will resume.

PURPOSE: Introduction – no Council vote required¹

Expedited Bill 17-20, Carryout Bag Tax – Suspension, sponsored by Lead Sponsor Councilmember Jawando and Co-sponsors Councilmembers Rice and Albornoz, Council President Katz, and Councilmembers Riemer and Navarro is scheduled to be introduced on March 31. A public hearing is scheduled for April 14; Council action is tentatively scheduled for immediately following the public hearing.

On March 5, 2020, Lawrence Hogan, Jr., Governor of Maryland issued a proclamation declaring a state of emergency and existence of a catastrophic public health emergency due to the novel coronavirus which can cause the respiratory disease COVID-19.

Expedited Bill 17-20 would suspend the imposition of the carryout bag tax until 15 days after the conclusion of the Maryland state of emergency. Within 7 days after the state of emergency ceases, Bill 17-20 would require the County Executive to notify retail establishments and the public of the date on which the imposition of the carryout bag tax will resume.

Re: Bill xx-20, Carry-out Bag Tax Suspension

Covid-19 has caused a myriad of issues in our community that affect residents from all walks of life. Social distancing and limiting contact in public places, person to person as well as the surfaces we touch, are key to reducing the spread of the virus.

I am introducing Bill xx-20, Carry-out Bag Tax Suspension as an Expedited Act during the Covid-19 pandemic. Some retail establishments, including some grocery stores, are currently prohibiting customers from using their personal reusable bags in stores. It is possible that more establishments will adopt the same policy soon. Handling reusable bags presents a potential public health risk to those employees who must bag items for customers, as well as to the customers themselves. Suspending the carry-out bag tax during the Covid-19 pandemic allows store bags to be used at no charge to customers which will hopefully minimize risk.

Bill xx-20 suspends the carryout bag tax and a retail establishment cannot collect the tax until 15 days after the state of emergency ceases. The County Executive must notify retail establishments and the public of the date that the carryout bag tax will resume within 7 days after the state of emergency for Covid-19 ceases.

While the carryout bag tax does generate some revenue for the County, the health and safety of all Montgomery County residents must come first. Covid-19 represents a threat that has never been seen before and we must act accordingly. I am asking each of my Council colleagues to join me in support of this bill. Thank you.
