Welcome to Christ Episcopal Church.
Thank you for joining us this evening.


The herb rosemary has, for centuries, held great meaning as the symbol of remembrance. Shakespeare referred, in this way, to rosemary in his play Hamlet, Act IV, scene V:
"There's rosemary; that's for remembrance. Pray, love, remember."

Legend says that the Virgin Mary, while resting, spread her cloak over a white flowering rosemary bush. The flowers turned the pale blue of her cloak, and from then on the bush was referred to as the "Rose of Mary."

Rosemary, according to another tradition, will grow for thirty-three years, until it reaches the height of Christ when he was crucified, then it will die.

We hope this worship will help you "pray, love, and remember."
