'Intent to Apply' Form for MHLS Outreach Mini-Grant Program 2018

NYS Outreach Categorical Aid funds, received from the NYS Library Division of Library Development and administered by MHLS, will be used to fund mini-grants of up to \$2,000 per member library¹ to develop programs and services to attract and connect to outreach target populations and form relevant community partnerships at the local level.

Outreach target populations [as defined in Education Law §273 (1) (h) (1)] are those who are educationally disadvantaged, members of ethnic or minority groups in need of special library services, unemployed, blind, physically disabled, have developmental or learning disabilities, or who are aged or confined in institutions.

This mini-grant is contingent on 2018 funding by New York State. At this time we are seeking a simple 'Intent to Apply' from member libraries who are interested. Applications will be sent to libraries that have filed an Intent to Apply Form, when the state funding is confirmed.

Information & Requirements

Eligibility Criteria:

• All member libraries are welcome and encouraged to apply.

Intent to Apply Form

• Fill out the attached brief Intent to Apply Form and return it to Merribeth Advocate at MHLS. Intent to Apply Forms must be received by April 9, 2018. When the state funding is confirmed, applications will be sent to libraries that have filed an Intent to Apply Form.

Requirements:

- Funds must be used to improve library services for the outreach target group indicated by the library director in the application.
- Funds must be spent between January 1, 2018 and November 1, 2018. Receipts must be provided to MHLS for reimbursement.
- Funds may be used for:
 - Contracts for programs/trainers/tutors/assistive services (examples: to teach English to non-native speakers; to provide workforce development support; to provide sign-language interpretive services at public programs; for staff to learn Spanish or sign-language)
 - o **Library personnel** costs to support improved library service to outreach target groups
 - o **Library materials** (example: ESL DVDs; Foreign language materials)
 - Project equipment (examples: auxiliary aids and assistive technology such as ZoomText Magnifier/Reader; CCTV/Video Magnifier; FM Assistive Listening System)
 - o Project **supplies** (examples: whiteboard for tutors; workbooks for ESL & GED students)
 - Project publicity
 - Other purposes directly related to project success
