

# Meet the Author: Barbara Park (b. 1947-d. 2013)

The following questions from kids just like you and answers from Barbara Park were excerpted from the <u>June B. Jones website</u>.

*Did you always want to be an author?* Being a writer was never even on my radar screen. As a kid, I wanted to be on The Mickey Mouse Club, but apparently that required some kind of talent. In college, I planned to teach high school history and political science. I was hoping I could make history seem a little funnier.

*Is it hard trying to think like a kindergartner?* I have absolutely no trouble thinking like a five-year-old. My family and friends will confirm this. I don't think that I've ever met a "grownup" who is as mature on the inside as he or she appears to be on the outside. But even if we don't admit it, sometimes adults still feel nervous, and scared, and embarrassed, and even just plain silly. Personally, just because I don't lean over and tickle the person next to me at a meeting, doesn't mean that I never have the urge.

*What would you say if someone asked you, "How can I become an author?"* I would say, 1) read, read, read, read; 2) write, write, write; 3) rewrite, rewrite, rewrite; 4) and love what you're doing.

*Are you funny in real life, like you are when you are writing Junie B.?* I'm not sure my family thinks I'm as funny as I do. But I'm pretty sure they're wrong.

# Meet the Playwright: Allison Gregory

# The following questions and answers are excerpted from interviews with Ms. Gregory.

## What is your favorite part of the playwriting process? What is most

*challenging?* I'm always excited about starting a new play. Creating a new world with fresh characters is a thrill because I get to make up the rules! I choose when and why they say what they say or do what they do, and the consequences.

When was the first time you heard about Junie B. Jones? What sparked the initiative to adapt the stories into plays? I was approached by the artistic director of a theatre, asking me if I knew the books. I'd never heard of them, so I went right out to the bookstore and asked the salesman if he'd ever heard of a book series about a kid named Junie B. He didn't say a word. He just pointed to something behind me. So I turned around and there was a life size cut-out of Junie B. Jones in living color, along with shelves and shelves of books with her name on them. That was my intro.

*Why is it important for children to experience live professional theatre?* Theatre is NOW; it's something that happens in real time as we're actually watching it. That's incredibly radical in this age of electronic everything. Theatre creates community by the very fact that we have to be there for it to happen; theatre needs witnesses; it requires an audience, it ask more of us than TV or film or videos. And it gives us more in terms of experience, empathy, and humanity.

# Indigenous People's Day and Columbus Day

In this play, Junie B. and her classmates put on a Columbus Day play (presented in a flashback). Columbus Day, on the second Monday in October, was traditionally set aside to learn about Italian explorer, Christopher Columbus. In 2018, Governor Kim Reynolds issued a proclamation declaring that the second Monday in October will also be acknowledged as Indigenous People's Day in Iowa.

## The proclamation read as follows:

"This day recognizes the land now known as the State of Iowa, named in recognition of the Iowa Tribe, as well as the language used to identify many of our lakes, rivers, cities, counties, schools, buildings and considerably more, and reflects the inherent imprint of Indigenous Peoples," said the Iowa Department of Human Rights in a statement at the time. "This land has been home to Indigenous People since time immemorial, and without whom, the building of this state would not have been possible."

Did you know that "Iowa" is a Siouan word? Over the past centuries, many Native American tribes, including the Ioway, Omaha, Sioux, Illini, Missouria, Potawatomi, and Otoe (among many others), have lived on the land that is now the state of Iowa. Do any of these names sound familiar to you? Many places in Iowa are named after Native American names, such as Maquoketa (bear river), Keosauqua (the bend in the river), and Wapello (the prince). Look at a map of Iowa and see how many other Native American words and names you can locate and translate.


As of today, there is only one federally recognized Native American tribe in Iowa, the Sac and Fox Tribe of the Mississippi. Their tribal name is Meskwaki. (Red Earth People).

# **Discussion Questions for fans of Junie B. Jones**

Junie B. is not allowed to use the word "hate" in Mrs. Scary's room. What other words could she use to describe that feeling instead?

Mrs. Scary tells Junie B. that if she does something nice for May she'll feel proud inside. She says, "It will feel like a gift you've given yourself." Tell about a time you helped someone when you didn't have to. How did it make you feel?

Junie B. tells the story of what happened by writing in her journal. What do you think May would write if she were to tell what happened in her journal? Think of ways in which it would be the same and way in which it would be different.

Junie B. and May have a hard time getting along. Why do you think that is? Do you think they will ever be friends? Why or why not? May and Mrs. Scary have three rules about tattling. Do you think they are good rules? What rules would you make? Is it ever okay to tattle on someone?

When a book is adapted into a play, often the playwright has to change things to make them work in the play. Read the Junie B. Jones books Jingle Bells, Batman Smells! (P.S. So Does May.) and Shipwrecked after watching the play. Think about what is different and the same between the play and the books. Are the characters the same? What about the story?

#### **BONUS QUESTIONS:**

Which job would you like to have in this production: actor, director, backstage crew, or designer? What skills would you need to do this job? What would be easy for you? What would be the hardest of the job?

May has a hard time remembering Junie's middle initial, B, which stands for Beatrice. What other words start with b? Make your lists! See our hints to help you get started.


Once you've made your lists of "B" words, try a fun acting activity. Take one thing from each list and create a short scene or monologue using all four of them. Perform it for (or with) your family!
