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1 (WHEREUPON, the court proceeding commenced.)

2 THE COURT: Madam Court Reporter, we're here on
3 Hanson v. Hanson, 24-DR-1150. We are here on Zoom.
4 Both Mr. and Mrs. Hanson are present along with
5 Mrs. Hanson's lawyer, Mr. Scott Davis, and we were
6 here regarding follow up with respect to discovery.
7 In the meantime, I have made a ruling with respect
8 to the premarital agreement and the separation
9 agreement. It was my ruling -- I don't think I have
10 an order yet, Mr. Davis. I know I just got that
11 today.

12 MR. DAVIS: I prepared a proposed order the
13 same day I received the Court's ruling. I sent it
14 to Mr. Hanson and he has not yet responded.

15 THE COURT: All right. Mr. Hanson, I need you
16 to respond to that. Mr. Davis, if you will email
17 that to my judicial assistant, and then, Mr. Hanson,
18 if you will respond to whatever you don't agree with
19 in writing, just in an email, she'll print both of
20 them for me and then I will enter an order.

21 MR. HANSON: Absolutely, Your Honor. Mr. Davis
22 had gave me five days. I've got so much on my plate
23 right now. I'm not going to be early on too much
24 right now.

25 THE COURT: All right. Well, you're going to

1 have it to me tomorrow by close of business, please.

2 MR. HANSON: Absolutely, Your Honor.

3 THE COURT: All right. And my ruling,
4 basically, when I looked at it, it was clear to me
5 nobody has asked me to do anything with the
6 premarital agreement or separation agreement. So at
7 this juncture I'm not ruling on them with respect to
8 anything because it's not in front of me, but as far
9 as I'm concerned they're both in full force and
10 effect and that would limit your discovery requests,
11 Mr. Hanson.

12 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, I just wanted to make
13 sure you're aware that Mrs. Hanson demanded
14 discovery of me that goes beyond what I'm even
15 requesting of her and it feels like their discovery
16 tactics worked and accomplished exactly what they
17 wanted, which, you know, I don't know family law. I
18 don't know what's acceptable and what's not. So,
19 you know, I'm going to have to do some research and
20 try to familiarize myself with that or find another
21 attorney.

22 THE COURT: Right. And I'm not sure why
23 Mr. Davis did that. He can't tell me because it's
24 privileged. Maybe at the time he thought --

25 MR. DAVIS: I can.

1 THE COURT: Go ahead.

2 MR. DAVIS: Ms. Hanson represented herself for
3 a period of time and she sent the discovery request
4 before she retained me to represent her. I have not
5 sent such a discovery request and Mr. Hanson, in all
6 of his email communications to me, of which there
7 are many and which he likes to make a lot of
8 allegations, he can't seem to differentiate that.
9 And he made, his counsel, prior counsel, made that
10 argument to the Court at the hearing on which the
11 Court ruled.

12 And while Mr. Hanson says I have to research
13 this and I can't file that, on the 17th he sent a
14 second request for production of documents, despite
15 the Court's ruling, asking for various things
16 including lots of privileged information and on the
17 18th he filed a motion for contempt. So...

18 THE COURT: So Mr. Hanson, if they requested
19 discovery for you, I don't know why. I don't know
20 if she did it pro se. I don't know if at that time
21 she was going to challenge the agreement, but at
22 that time you didn't challenge them. So that is not
23 an issue.

24 Right now you are requesting discovery.
25 Mr. Davis has objected and I've granted that

1 objection. I've sustained it actually. So that
2 discovery is not going to be produced. And why it
3 was requested of you, I don't know and he doesn't
4 have to divulge that to me because it's
5 attorney-client privilege. And he's alluding to me
6 that Ms. Hanson did it. Not him.

7 MR. HANSON: But Your Honor, I informed the
8 Court it was in response to me demanding discovery
9 from her. I said this is a red line for me. I'm
10 not going to walk away from getting some discovery
11 into your finances after the last five years that
12 I've been through. And she responded by sending me
13 16 pages of interrogatories that she knew that would
14 be in the last thing in the world I would want to
15 do. I like my privacy and I don't like tedious
16 tasks.

17 THE COURT: Okay. That's not before me today,
18 sir. I have sustained their objection. You will
19 not be getting any further discovery from them that
20 you requested. If you do an additional request,
21 Mr. Davis will have to respond to that. Mr. Davis,
22 I did see that he filed something else. Are you
23 going to respond to that?

24 MR. DAVIS: Yes, ma'am. I'm going to file
25 another motion.

1 THE COURT: You file it and then set it in
2 front of me and I will do that. Mr. Hanson, any
3 discovery that you have not already asked for, and I
4 sustained the objection, you are free to ask for and
5 Mr. Davis will either object or provide it. But
6 right now you have two agreements that are in full
7 force and effect. Nobody's asked me to do anything
8 different with them. So I am proceeding with this
9 case, until somebody asks me differently, that those
10 agreements are going to govern how this divorce goes
11 down.

12 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, I've already said I
13 want to throw out the postmarital agreement and I
14 asked Mr. Davis about that. I said will she
15 withdraw the objections if I'm willing to throw out
16 the postmarital agreement? If I look at the balance
17 sheets --

18 THE COURT: So what did he say?

19 MR. HANSON: He said no. She's not willing to
20 do it, but if you look at the balance sheet --

21 THE COURT: Hold on, Mr. Hanson. So it stays
22 in full force and effect unless you file something
23 otherwise.

24 MR. HANSON: But Your Honor --

25 THE COURT: You're a lawyer. You don't just

1 come to CMCs and make decisions. You have to file
2 the appropriate document, set it for a hearing, and
3 then I will hear it. You have two agreements.
4 They're in place. Nobody's asked me to set them
5 aside. So that is how this divorce is going to go
6 until something is filed.

7 MR. HANSON: Okay.

8 THE COURT: We have to follow the law. You
9 know that.

10 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, I just try to have
11 some level of efficiency and, you know, Ms. Hodz got
12 a hearing in one day that I wasn't available for.
13 I've been trying to get one simple issue in front of
14 the Court for seven months.

15 THE COURT: What is the issue? What is the
16 issue?

17 MR. HANSON: The only reason any of this is
18 happening is because Mrs. Hanson never shared any of
19 her financial information while we were married.

20 THE COURT: No. Stop.

21 MR. HANSON: Well, you asked me.

22 THE COURT: What is the issue you want me to
23 hear? Just answer the question.

24 MR. HANSON: Discovery into Mrs. Hanson's
25 finances for at least as much as I had to give to

1 her.

2 THE COURT: I've already ruled on that. I
3 sustained the objection. You're not getting those
4 finances that you've already requested. If there's
5 additional documents that you want, you can request
6 them and then Mr. Davis can decide if he's going to
7 provide them or set the matter before me. The only
8 way that you would get additional documentation is
9 if the premarital agreement or the separation
10 agreement is set aside.

11 So if you want to set them aside, you need to
12 file the motion and have a hearing on it. If I did
13 set it aside, you would be entitled to possibly more
14 discovery but you got to go in order.

15 MR. HANSON: I guess I don't understand the
16 "possibly". Because, you know, I have some
17 protection here. I've been honest every step of the
18 way and, you know, Your Honor, I know you can't know
19 the facts of every case. You have a lot of cases
20 and mine isn't any more important or different, but
21 there's --

22 THE COURT: Sir, what kind of law do you
23 practice?

24 MR. HANSON: I was a work comp. defense
25 attorney.

1 THE COURT: Okay. When did you get out of law
2 school?

3 MR. HANSON: 2007.

4 THE COURT: Okay. So a few years. Seven
5 years. I'm still you can remember Contracts 101.
6 When someone enters into a contract, it's legally
7 binding, it's something they decided to do, and the
8 only way it can be thrown out is you need to go
9 research that. It's a very simple contract. I can
10 even tell you the case. C-R-U-P-I is the contract
11 case that governs family law. C-R-U-P-I. Crupi v.
12 Crupi. So if you enter into an agreement, it's
13 legally enforceable and binding unless you come to
14 Court and ask me to set it aside, and you need to go
15 look up what the legal standard is for me to set
16 aside agreements between the parties. So I can't do
17 anything until you do that. Unfortunately, you
18 can't use a divorce to go fishing for personal
19 information from Ms. Hanson when you've entered into
20 an agreement that resolves your divorce.

21 Now, if you go find the legal standards to how
22 an agreement is set aside and you come in here and
23 you prove that, according to the law, I need to set
24 aside either or both of those agreements, then that
25 changes the whole course of this case and we'll go

1 in a different direction. But as we sit here today,
2 there's two binding agreements. You've settled your
3 divorce case and it's ready for final hearing.

4 I mean I have to follow the law. I'm not
5 trying to be difficult. You settled your case. As
6 we sit here today, this case is done and over and
7 just needs a final hearing. If you believe
8 something went wrong in that agreement at the end,
9 you need to file the appropriate document and do
10 your legal research.

11 MR. HANSON: Yes, Your Honor.

12 THE COURT: All right. Anything else,
13 Mr. Davis?

14 MR. DAVIS: I have things that need to be
15 scheduled. The Court made reference, I believe, to
16 we might possibly address that today. If you prefer
17 I just email your judicial assistant, I'm happy to
18 do that, Your Honor.

19 THE COURT: What are the issues that you want
20 to set? And Mr. Hanson, I'll give you until Monday
21 morning so you have the weekend. So by Monday
22 morning. Mr. Davis is going to email that order to
23 my JA today. Mr. Davis, please put in there that
24 Mr. Hanson is going to be providing his comments so
25 that my JA gets triggered. Mr. Hanson, you have

1 until Monday morning. Nothing fancy. If you decide
2 to do your own order though, please track his order
3 so it goes in the same order and I can see the
4 differences or you free to say in an email I
5 disagree with paragraph 1 because X, Y, Z. I
6 disagree with paragraph 4 because of X, Y, Z. Do an
7 email or draft your own order as long as they follow
8 the same order so I'm not having to go in all
9 different directions. If you're following something
10 and don't like something say I don't like this
11 paragraph, but please follow the same order. So the
12 first paragraph should match. We came for hearing.
13 So just track the same order, please.

14 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, please forgive me, but
15 if I'm going to file a motion for rehearing, I
16 should still say this is what the order says, work
17 with him on that, and after the order is entered,
18 file a motion got it.

19 THE COURT: Yes. If an order is not entered,
20 you can file a motion for reconsideration. If it is
21 entered, you file a motion for rehearing.

22 MR. HANSON: Okay. Do you have a preference on
23 which one I do?

24 THE COURT: Nope.

25 MR. HANSON: Okay.

1 THE COURT: Makes no difference.

2 MR. DAVIS: Your Honor, the Court asked me what
3 I have to set. It's, No. 1, a motion to compel.
4 No. 2, a motion to appoint Guardian ad Litem. No.
5 3, motion for psychological evaluation.

6 THE COURT: We have a child in this case?

7 MR. DAVIS: Two.

8 MR. HANSON: Two. That's why I've been trying
9 to rush this through, Your Honor. It's killing me
10 to watch what it's doing to them. It's the only
11 reason I'm so flustered is it's affecting my health
12 and affecting my children. I don't understand all
13 of the delay tactics. I don't know if Your Honor is
14 aware of the fact that Mr. Davis stipulated to have
15 the mandatory disclosures completed by June 28th.
16 He didn't make any effort --

17 THE COURT: Mr. Hanson, we're not going
18 backwards. You've expressed your complete
19 frustration that this case is not going in the
20 direction. I'm going to make sure it does. I've
21 already told you that. I've seen you twice in the
22 last couple weeks. I'm going to set another
23 hearing. It's going to go forward. There's not
24 going to be any delay tactics. I'm going to tell
25 you I know what lawyers delay and what lawyers

1 don't. Mr. Davis is not one of those lawyers that
2 I've ever had a problem with the delay tactics. I'm
3 on top of this case and I don't like that you said I
4 don't care about your case as much as I care about
5 anyone else's. I have roughly --

6 MR. HANSON: No.

7 THE COURT: Stop. I can probably tell you any
8 of them that are litigated all of the facts, inside
9 and out, who's on them, and what they do. I'm very,
10 very on top of my cases. You've asked me to be on
11 top of this case. I'm on top of it. I'm going to
12 be on top of it. We're not talking about the past.
13 We're going forward. Mr. Davis.

14 MR. HANSON: But --

15 THE COURT: Stop.

16 MR. HANSON: Your Honor just to clarify, I did
17 not say you cared about my case less. I said my
18 case is no more important than any other case.

19 THE COURT: Every case is important to me.

20 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, it wasn't meant as an
21 insult at all. I'm like everybody else.

22 THE COURT: I didn't take it as an insult. All
23 right. You have a motion for contempt. What's the
24 basis of the motion for contempt, Mr. Davis.

25 MR. DAVIS: I do not have a motion for

1 contempt. It's a motion to compel.

2 THE COURT: Is it discovery?

3 MR. DAVIS: It's mandatory disclosures. He
4 filed mandatory disclosure, but it wasn't full and
5 complete.

6 THE COURT: And you also have a motion for
7 Guardian ad Litem and psychological evaluation?

8 MR. DAVIS: Yes, ma'am.

9 THE COURT: Mr. Hanson, are you going to be
10 filing anything? Are you going to be filing a
11 motion for reconsideration, motion for rehearing, or
12 motion to set aside?

13 MR. HANSON: Yes. I'm going to be filing one
14 of those things related to Ms. Hodz's withdraw and
15 one of those things related to the order on the
16 subpoena. And then on the -- I've already filed a
17 motion for finding of contempt and enforcement on
18 the mandatory disclosure. I've got a motion to
19 compel I have to file that I don't have from
20 Ms. Hodz yet. I'm hoping that the Court -- I've
21 emailed Ms. Hodz's office several times trying to
22 get this. Apparently the prior law firm had drafted
23 one and I want to at least be able to have whatever
24 work they did. So yes, Your Honor. I do have more
25 things to set and I already have a motion for

1 contempt and enforcement filed.

2 THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Hanson, I want to
3 caution you. Before you file a motion for rehearing
4 or reconsideration with respect to Ms. Hodz's
5 withdraw, please do the research on that. I can
6 only think of, on the top of my head, one reason
7 that I can't let her withdraw and that would be that
8 we had a trial pending next week. So I can't force
9 her to stay on a case. So please just do the
10 research before we come back and do that.

11 You didn't like her. She didn't like working
12 with you. There's no reason to keep you guys on the
13 same case and there's nothing pending. So there's
14 nothing for me to reconsider. I can't force a
15 lawyer to work on a case when there's irreparable
16 differences. That's done and over. So let's go
17 forward.

18 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, may I explain to you
19 why. It's more because I had one-day notice. I
20 stayed up all night to try to get my rights
21 protected. I didn't know what they were. No one
22 would answer any of my questions. I literally
23 stayed up all night and I got sick for a week
24 because of it. I thought I had reasonable arguments
25 and I don't believe you ever even looked at them.

1 Did you read my objection?

2 THE COURT: I just told you. The only thing I
3 can think of that I would have to keep her on the
4 case is if you were set for trial within a week or
5 two. I know the law and that's the only thing I can
6 think of. There might be another thing, but in my
7 30-plus years of practicing law and being a judge,
8 that's the only thing I know of to be able to not
9 get out of a hearing is if you're set for a trial.
10 And that's still tough for me to force someone to do
11 a trial, but I seen it one time. One time I've
12 seen, and it was when I was a litigator, that the
13 judge forced the lawyer to stay on the case because
14 the trial was set the next week.

15 MR. HANSON: If you didn't review --

16 THE COURT: I didn't say I didn't review your
17 stuff.

18 MR. HANSON: Okay.

19 THE COURT: I'm just saying that's the only
20 thing. And I have to look at the docket and I
21 looked at the docket and you're not set for trial.
22 I'm going to set this. Mr. Hanson, Mr. Davis, are
23 you available on January 6th at 2:30? It's just
24 going to be for a case management conference.

25 MR. DAVIS: Yes, Your Honor.

1 THE COURT: Mr. Hanson?

2 MR. HANSON: Just a moment, Your Honor.

3 THE COURT: No problem. Take your time.

4 MR. HANSON: And please remind me of the time
5 you mentioned.

6 THE COURT: No problem. 2:30.

7 MR. HANSON: I have a gymnastics practice
8 issue.

9 THE COURT: I can do it at 4:00 also.

10 MR. HANSON: 4:00. I can get home by then
11 after dropping her off.

12 THE COURT: Does that work for you, Mr. Davis?

13 MR. DAVIS: Yes, ma'am.

14 THE COURT: Will you be able to have all of
15 your motions filed by December 31st? Two weeks.

16 MR. HANSON: I would hope so. Your Honor, I'm
17 dealing with the flood insurance company. It's
18 taking up a lot of my time.

19 THE COURT: Mr. Hanson, it's completely up to
20 you.

21 MR. HANSON: I would like a little more time.

22 THE COURT: You're the one that wants me to
23 fast track this case. So it's up to you. What date
24 will you have all of your motions filed by?

25 MR. DAVIS: He finds time to send me multiple

1 emails a day these days.

2 MR. HANSON: I wish you would respond to them
3 and answer the questions in them, sir.

4 THE COURT: Mr. Hanson, how long do you need to
5 file all the motions you want to file?

6 MR. HANSON: How about -- can I have until the
7 January 6th date?

8 THE COURT: You can have whatever you'd like.
9 You want January 6th?

10 MR. HANSON: Yep.

11 THE COURT: So on January 6th every motion you
12 want me to hear in the near future is going to be
13 filed?

14 MR. HANSON: Yes, Your Honor. If I get it
15 filed earlier --

16 THE COURT: No. That's fine, but now I'm going
17 to set a hearing at a different date. Now I'm going
18 to set you for a hearing on the 21st of January. I
19 have the afternoon available.

20 MR. DAVIS: I'd ask it to be as late as
21 possible. Definitely after -- I'd say after 4:00.
22 One of my kids has a field trip that day. Special
23 needs child. I have to chaperone. It's not even a
24 want to. It's either mom or I have to go.

25 THE COURT: Okay. I can do 4:30.

1 MR. DAVIS: That's fine. Thank you.

2 THE COURT: Does that work for you, Mr. Hanson,
3 with your kids' schedule?

4 MR. HANSON: I'm sorry. Just getting to 1/21.

5 THE COURT: 1/21 at 4:30.

6 MR. HANSON: Yes. I can do that.

7 THE COURT: 1/21 at 4:30. We're going to be
8 hearing Mr. Davis's motion he just mentioned.
9 Mr. Hanson, you have the ability to file whatever
10 you need to file by January 6th, if you want to file
11 your objections or anything. And then all motions
12 that are pending on the 6th will be noticed for the
13 21st at 4:30 via Zoom unless they're not
14 appropriate.

15 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, you mentioned it's
16 going to be a status conference.

17 THE COURT: I did say status conference.

18 MR. DAVIS: I don't know that we'll get all
19 that done.

20 THE COURT: We'll have a status conference. I
21 did say that. I need to make sure they're set
22 together. Thank you, Mr. Hanson. We'll have a
23 status conference. So everyone would have had time
24 to review the motions and we'll decide how we're
25 going to set all the motions.

1 And Mr. Hanson, I'm not trying to be difficult
2 with you on the Hodz thing. I'm just trying to
3 direct your energy to the relief that you need.
4 Okay. I know you want some relief. Let's focus on
5 that and not on things --

6 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, it's no disrespect to
7 you. I just want to make sure I retain any
8 appellate issues that may come up. Because this is
9 an issue that I will not stop pursuing and I want to
10 make sure I have all my bases covered in an area
11 that I don't understand that well.

12 THE COURT: All right. So if you want to
13 appeal my ruling with respect to Mrs. Hodz's'
14 withdraw, you do have to do a motion for rehearing
15 because they won't take it.

16 MR. HANSON: I'm not suggesting that I want to
17 appeal that issue. I'm just saying -- in what I did
18 you had to preserve issues for appeal and I don't
19 know if it's the same in family law. I hope that
20 makes sense.

21 THE COURT: It's my understanding -- and I'm
22 not an appellate judge. It's my understanding,
23 before you can appeal, you do have to do a motion
24 for rehearing. That's what I've seen. I don't know
25 if you can do a motion for reconsideration. I know

1 that you are required to do a motion for rehearing.

2 MR. HANSON: Great.

3 THE COURT: So we'll get that order done and if
4 you want to do that, we'll discuss that again.
5 Anything that's been filed as of January 6th will be
6 up for debate on the CMC on 1/21 at 4:30 and we'll
7 get everything scheduled.

8 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, the motion for
9 contempt and enforcement, does that have any sort of
10 a fast-track option or is that just like any other
11 motion?

12 THE COURT: Nope. I'm going to do it all
13 together. I'll find you some expedited time. I
14 have little pockets of time I hide for situations
15 like this. I will get you some time after that
16 21st.

17 MR. HANSON: Your Honor, the order was
18 October 28th and they had 10 days to do it. And,
19 you know, I'm sorry, Your Honor.

20 THE COURT: They've got issues with you on the
21 same subject matter. So we need to hear it all
22 together and clear it all up.

23 MR. HANSON: They never followed up with that
24 until just recently. No one ever cared about it.
25 That's a problem I have too. I had a lot of records

1 mailed to me and I never went to either attorneys'
2 office to drop them off for scanning. And then I
3 had Helene come in and flood my house. I don't know
4 where the records are. I had them mailed to me.
5 I'll do my best to find them. I told Mr. Davis he
6 can subpoena whatever he wants. You know, again,
7 I'll look for the records and I guess I'll have to
8 go through requesting them again if I can't find
9 them.

10 THE COURT: Mr. Davis, if I've got any motions
11 for contempt, motions to produce, motions to compel,
12 you guys can look at them and try to resolve them
13 and send the documents over and then they'll become
14 moot. So you're free to try to get each other what
15 you want to eliminate any of these motions being
16 heard. Okay.

17 MR. HANSON: Yes, Your Honor.

18 THE COURT: I hope everyone has a nice holiday
19 and see everyone on the 21st of January.

20 MR. DAVIS: You, too. Have a nice holiday.
21 Take care.

22 THE COURT: You, too. Bye-bye.
