


Artist Statement:

As I pondered the theme of strength for the journey, I was inspired by the faithfulness and audacity of four friends on behalf of another. Breaking through a hole in the roof made way for a transformative encounter with Jesus, who proceeded to break open a moment of healing liberation not just for the one with the mat, but for all who were bearing witness to this Divine collaboration. Ushering in strength for the journey and even life anew, a miraculous movement of the Spirit intertwined with the tangible efforts of beloved community. I wonder, too, how we are still being invited into this Spirit-filled and audacious collaboration with God on behalf of one another and for all God's creation.

In creating this piece, people within the North Carolina Synod were invited to share what brings them strength for the journey as they too pondered this year's synod assembly themes. I offered these responses as a written prayer layer on the canvas. As prayers and paint mixed together, the image of four friends looking down through a hole in the roof became the centering form in a blooming coneflower. The coneflower, chosen for its healing and restorative properties, also evokes the liberating and healing work of God. The gold accents draw the eye to the sacredness of ordinary connections, offering a glimpse of the Spirit's movement in the midst of it all. Through Jesus, your Word made flesh, you speak to us and call us to witness; forgiveness through the cross, life to those entombed by death, the way of your self-giving love. For your Word of life, O God, **We give you thanks and praise**.

Send your Spirit of truth, O God; rekindle your gifts within us: renew our faith, increase our hope, and deepen our love, for the sake of a world in need. THE GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark Chapter Three. Glory to you, O Lord

[Jesus went home;]²⁰and the crowd came together again, so that[Jesus and the disciples] could not even eat. ²¹When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, "He has gone out of his mind." ²²And the scribes who came down from Jerusalem said, "He has Beelzebul, and by the ruler of the demons he casts out demons." ²³And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables. "How can Satan cast out Satan? ²⁴If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. ²⁵And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand, ²⁶And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come. ²⁷But no one can enter a strong man's house and plunder his property without first tying up the strong man; then indeed the house can be plundered. ²⁸"Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven for their sins and whatever blasphemies they utter; ²⁹but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an eternal \sin^{30} for they had said, "He has an unclean spirit." ³¹Then his mother and his brothers came; and standing outside, they sent to him and called him. ³²A crowd was sitting around him; and they said to him, "Your mother and your brothers and sisters are outside, asking for you." ³³And he replied, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" ³⁴And looking at those who sat around him, he said, "Here are my mother and my brothers! ³⁵Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother."
