ACCOUNTING

Mission College participated in the IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistant (VITA) for the third year in a row. College students provided assistance to the community on filing their incomes taxes. Total refunds amounted to \$135K, with more than 70 returns prepared.

Accounting department chair Teresa Thompson presented at the Teachers of Accounting at Two Year Colleges (TACTYC) national conference on the adoption of Online Educational Resource (OER) including free textbooks and supporting materials and on Non-traditional classroom engagement techniques.

Coming up in Accounting is the SAP class! Instructor Jenny Tseng is working hard to develop this new class, which will focus on cloud computing and analytics for accounting. Students will learn theory along with hands-on exercises using SAP By Design and Power BI. These are very marketable skills for the industry.

Based on student's feedback, Accounting has created a flexible CE pathway to accommodate for their busy schedules.

APPRENTICESHIP

In Spring 2019, the State of California Government Operations Agency Information Technology (IT) Apprenticeship registered its third cohort of apprentices.

The first cohort completed instruction in August. Approximately 23% of the apprentices from that same cohort were promoted and able to advance into new careers as IT professionals. As an IT Associate, an apprentice can earn up to \$62,000 annually. Although this career change profoundly improves the earning capacity of the apprentices who are part of the program,

promotion is not automatic. Upon completion of the program, apprentices must meet qualifications to become IT Associates and follow merit rules in order to promote within the state. Funding of this program is made possible through a federal grant held at Mission College.

The Associate in Science in Business Administration for Transfer Degree is the most popular transfer degree at Mission College. Last year, we had over

Career Training

Students in the Business Administration program will attain the working knowledge and applicable skills to begin their career in business or further their education by transferring units to a University of California (UC) or California State University (CSU) campus of their choice. Business Students will also have the opportunity to receive college credit internships with our local business company network.

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BUSINESS & WORKFORCE

In May 2019, the Mission College Transit Apprenticeship program won a Bay Area Metro Award presented by the Association of Bay Area Governments. This award was in recognition in creating an apprenticeship partnership program with the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority (VTA), its Amalgamated Transit Union (ATU) Local 265 and Mission College. Apprenticeship leaders were honored at a special ceremony on June 6, 2019 in Oakland. Since the implementation of the apprentice program 18 months ago, the retention rate for the VTA employees has rocketed from 50% to 95%. This summer over 270 graduates received a Certificate of Achievement in Coach Operator Program and participated in a ceremony celebrating their accomplishments.

CHILD DEVELOPMENT

In November of 2018, the Child Development Department celebrated the retirement of long-time faculty member, Camilla Weiberg who served at Mission College for over 13 years. Cam was instrumental in pioneering the changes in our department, which supported student achievement and success. Among these were establishing Child Development courses taught bilingually in Spanish, increasing course offerings taught online, collaboration with the Santa Clara Adult Education to offer Child Development courses at their location, and her management of the California Child Development Training Consortium Grant, which provided stipends for students upon successful completion of their child development courses. A great friend, mentor and colleague, worked with the California Curriculum Alignment Project so that Mission College could offer an AS-T degree option along with our traditional degree to students seeking to pursue their higher education. This spring, of the 43 students that graduated, 30 have earned their AS-T degree.

In April, the city of Santa Clara hosted the **California Association for the Education of Young Children** annual conference and the Child Development Department took that

opportunity to support the professional development of our students. With the support of Strong Workforce funds, we were able to send a group of students to this conference. The students shared their conference experiences with other students by giving presentations in over a dozen classes.

In 2019, 62 Child Development students earned a degree and/or certificate in Child Development. To honor their accomplishments, our department hosted their annual **Celebration of Graduation** for our graduates and their families. Students were presented with a gold circle-of-children pin from the faculty to commemorate the occasion, with those earning a degree receiving a special stole to wear at Commencement.

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COMPUTER APPLICATIONS

Computer Applications Program (CAP) Faculty member Judie Golden wrote two new non-credit courses, Learning the Keyboard and Computers Simplified for Beginning Learners and a non-credit Certificate of Completion, Beginning Computer Skills. These will be offered in Spring 2020.

CAP Faculty will be creating two certificates for the Business Information Worker (BIW) career pathway, BIW I and BIW 2. The courses for these are 90% in place, but one more course, Office 365/SharePoint, will be created to be part of the BIW 2 Certificate.

BUSINESS PROFESSOR

Participates in Educational Study Program to Cuba

In late May 2019, Wendy Shan, Business Professor and Department Chair, had the opportunity to participate in an educational study program in Havana, Cuba, through the Center of Global Business at University of Maryland. Wendy, along with business faculty from universities such as lowa State, University of Florida, and Howard University were able to learn about Cuban history, media, economics, health care, and United States-Cuba relations from professors and historians at the University of Havana. They particularly focused on the tourism sector in their discussions of the Cuban economy and analyzed a case study of Airbnb in Cuba. Moreover, Wendy and her colleagues were able to take a walking tour of Old Havana, see the Museum of the Revolution, meet with Cuban entrepreneurs and tour privately owned businesses such as a print shop, clothing company, cigar factory, restaurants, and a dance studio. According to Wendy, the trip to Cuba was "an amazing experience" and

Wendy will partner with 11 other faculty from universities all over the country on a paper that will be submitted to three conferences by November of this year.

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GRAPHIC DESIGN

The staff and students of the Graphic Design (GDES) and Multimedia Department welcomed nearly 100 attendees, which included 15–20% local industry professionals, to our 2019 Portfolio Exhibition organized by our newest full-time faculty, Jeanine Flores.

Our GDES program represents the wonderful diversity of the Bay Area within our student population. This semester boasted thirty-one students, eight with Bachelor's degrees, four of those having previously earned a Master's degree. Another five of our students have plans to transfer to a four-year university.

This annual portfolio exhibition represented the final capstone course, GDS 85: Professional Design Portfolio and Career Preparation, across two degree programs: **Associate of Science (AS)** in Graphic Arts (2 students) or Graphic Design (16 students), and five certifications: Graphic Arts (1 student), Graphic Design (9 students), Digital Illustration (4 students), Web Development (1 student), and Web Design (2 students). Students interest areas included: Corporate Marketing and Communication, Illustration, UI/UX Design, Web Design and Development, Motion Graphics and Digital Video, Exhibit Design, Photography, and Video Game Development

HEALTH OCCUPATIONS

On Friday, May 24, 2019, the Health Occupations Department held their Pinning Ceremony for graduating Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVNs) and Registered Nurses (RNs).

Seventy percent of the new RN cohort are enrolled in the concurrent Bachelor of Science in Nursing program with Ohio University.

This year, nursing students will have increased access to Santa Clara Valley Hospital and Health System clinics. These clinical experiences will offer tremendous learning opportunities for our students. The department recently acquired two up-to-date nursing simulation mannequins that will help learning for students.
