Our Welcomers are available to assist with any of the following access information.

Welcome whether you are joining us today in our building or online. Our cameras focus on those who are leading our service but if you are in the building and would like to ensure that you are not caught on camera, please sit beyond the pillars on the south of the church (to the right as you enter).

Welcome if you are disabled, unwell, have experiences of dementia, physical, sensory, cognitive or mental health issues, or are neurodivergent. The order of service is available online or large print copies. The hearing loop works best on the south side of the church. Step free access to church is via the ramp on the north side, and to the Crypt and Hall via lifts in the NW porch and Pavilion.

Welcome to babies, children and young people. We understand that young children make noise. If your baby becomes upset during the service you are welcome to take them to the back if they need that to settle or to our children's church room provided for them. We support breastfeeding in services or we also have a room allocated. We have children's church groups during the service (currently alternate weeks) and a monthly group for teenagers after our service.

Welcome to all experiences of race, culture and language. At the Lord's Prayer we are all invited to bring the gift of our first language to our worship. Because of historical links to Soho our 1.30pm is in Cantonese and our Welcomers are happy to help where they can if you are new to English. Of course, you are also very welcome if you are LGBTQIA+.

But we tacitly accept a world that smothers the dreams of those with less power and wealth.



The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading Acts 17: 22-31 read by Angela Dawson

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him - though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said, "For we too are his offspring." Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.'

Second Reading read by Ramesh Puvaneswaran

In one of our Sunday Eucharists 15 months ago we heard the story of Justin Chaponda, a 36 year old Malawian. He spoke about the challenge of growing enough food for his extended family as the one annual rainy season becomes increasingly shorter.

A couple of years ago Justin achieved his dream to establish a community-based organisation, promoting health and wellbeing in the rural area around his village. Over the past year they have built 3 fishponds, using the profits to pay secondary school fees for orphans. Their farm provides extra food for the families supporting orphans. Their volunteers care for those who are very sick and dying. And they regularly educate the community about issues such as HIV and gender-based violence.

Cyclone Freddy hit Malawi in early March. Although many miles from the centre, Justin's rural community has still been devastated. 70 houses were destroyed, 40 suffered significant damage, in particular the loss of roofs, and 50 latrines have collapsed. This is especially concerning in the context of the deadliest cholera outbreak in the country's history. 2 months on, families are still living in temporary shelters like schools. But more worryingly, their crops have been destroyed and people need food. They desperately need to do irrigation farming. They need a second harvest.

All and also with you.


Lift up your hearts.

Unknown yet revealing God, it is our duty and joy to thank and praise you, because from one ancestor you made all nations to inhabit the earth, and you allotted their times and boundaries, so they would search for you, in whom they live and move and have their being. While our lives are circumscribed by the limitations of our minds and bodies, your life is beyond our reach and outside our imagining. Yet in your mercy you embodied all your promises to your people in the sending of your Son, and through his dying and rising you have brought us to your throne of grace. And so we gladly thank you, with angels and archangels, and all who with your ascended Son sit at your right hand on high, singing the hymn of your unending praise.



Sending and accompanying God, you do not leave us orphaned, but in Christ you make us your adopted children, and in your Spirit you send an Advocate to be with us forever. By the power of that same Spirit, take the fragile flesh of your people and transform it into the resurrected glory of your church; and come down upon these gifts of bread and wine and make them be for us the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Who, at supper with his disciples, took bread, gave you thanks, broke the bread, and gave it to them, saying, 'Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.' After supper he took the cup. Again he gave you thanks, and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Drink this, all of you: this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.'


As our Saviour taught us, so we pray, each in our first language:
