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Options for use of the Available Fund Balance as of July 31, 2023

History

Annually a Fund Balance Analysis is prepared after the completion of the financial audit to assess if there are funds available to be distributed to the NCS schools or to be used in a different capacity.

The Fund Balance Analysis was prepared and presented to the Finance Committee at the August 30, 2023 meeting (Attachment C) showing \$543,000 available for distribution. A motion was made to pay down the CALPERS Unfunded Liability ("UAL") by making an Additional Discretionary Payment ("ADP") and the rest moved into the Stifel Money Market account, amounts at the discretion of NCS staff.

At the September 29, 2023, Board of Managers meeting a motion was made and passed to table the decision to use the available funds to make a one time PERS UAL payment due to concerns about the interest rate differential between the CALPERS UAL(6.8%) and the NCS building mortgage (8.7%).

Option #1

Pay down CALPERS UAL -\$200,000 & difference to Stifel Money Market (5% interest bearing)
As of July 31, 2023, the NCS UAL was \$1,099,000 but going up to \$1,829,595 as of July 31, 2024. A PERS actuary was consulted and discussed making an ADP of \$200,000, which would save an estimated **\$209,000** in interest plus extra savings annually on the required UAL payments.

Option #2

Pay off NCS Mortgage – \$214,618 (required payment=\$1,932/month) and difference to Stifel Money Market (5% interest bearing)

The mortgage was refinanced on July 1, 2018, for \$285,000 with a 5 year fixed interest rate of 5.952%, after 5 years to an adjustable rate no higher than 13.952%. The adjustable rate went into effect on July 1, 2023, to 8.714%, with the next adjustment on January 1, 2024. The loan is being amortized over 25 years with a balloon payment due on July 1, 2028. We spoke with our contact at Fremont Bank in June, prior to the rate adjustment and were advised to hold off for a few months to see what interest rates did. For a commercial loan, we were told due to the small dollar amount of the loan and the costs to refinance (closing costs, appraisals, etc.) would not make fiscal sense and probably land us with a very similar rate.

Beginning on August 1, 2023, an additional principal payment of \$1,000 is being made increasing our monthly payment to \$2,932. Prior to the pandemic we were also paying an extra \$1,000 towards principal each month. Fremont Bank representative approximates savings if pay off entire mortgage to be between **\$50,000-54,000**.

Option #2b -Option #2 and Secure a Line of Credit using the NCS building as collateral that can fund spending in between championship seasons or in a downturn in the economy or other events that affect the cash flow.

Option #3-Pay down CALPERS UAL - \$200,000 and pay off the NCS Mortgage-\$214,618.

102. **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE****A. Purpose**

3. The regional representatives, Class A schools' representative, the district superintendents' representative and the school boards' representative shall be appointed by the President and approved by the Board of Managers.
4. The regional representatives, Class A schools' representative, the district superintendents' representative and the school boards' representative must be representatives to the Board of Managers.
5. The NCS Section Commissioner and the legal consultant shall be ex-officio non-voting members.

D. Term of Office

1. The Section President, Section President-elect and Section past-president shall be appointed for consecutive two-year terms.
2. The female CIF delegate, representative of under-represented populations, school boards' representative, superintendents' representative and at-large representative shall be appointed for three-year terms. The female CIF delegate, representative of under-represented populations, school boards' representative and superintendents' representatives may not serve more than six consecutive years.
3. Regional and Class A school representatives shall be appointed for two-year terms. A regional or Class A schools' representative may not serve more than four consecutive years.

- Girls teams that exist in the Oakland section and are part of the NCS, will compete in the Division 2 East Bay subsection.
- These entries will be exclusively decided by each school and submitted to the NCS Divisional tournament director by the league representative on or before Sunday leading up to the weekend of the Divisional tournament.
- Bracket size will vary per the number of entries and member schools in each division.
- A process for submitting entries will be determined by the tournament committee.
- Events for boys and girls will take place at the same venue.

Seeding:

- All competitors proposed for a seed must be submitted for a seed before the seeding of that weight class begins. All finalization of seeds will be done per weight class by representative voting.

 - c. Returning CIF State qualifier
 - d. Returning NCS medalist (place and weight class)
 - e. Overall record (all wins and losses)
 - Tournaments (include size [64/32/24/16/dual] and place/finish)
 - Section losses
 - f. Common Opponents
 - g. CIF State Rankings
- Two representative(s) per league will be allowed at the Divisional seeding meeting, but will be allowed only 1 voting representative. Each league will be responsible to decide who their representative(s) will be.
- Events for boys and girls will take place at the same venue.

NCS Masters Entries:

- Qualifiers from both the Boys and Girls NCS Divisional tournament will be entered into the NCS Master event
- Event for boys and girls will take place at the same venue
- Brackets will consist of 20 wrestlers for both boys and girls divisions
- Number of entries per division is statistically supported and will be reviewed in a two year cycle by the wrestling management committee based on two-year medal counts. Each Division will be allocated their number of entries based on their performance at the NCS Championships.
- Each division will be allotted two automatic qualifiers.
- There will be 2 At-Large entries per weight decided on at the NCS seeding meeting. Only wrestlers that compete in their divisional tournament will be eligible for an At-Large bid.

Rationale in Support of Proposal:

1. Equality (Advantages to combined Boys and Girls tournaments) - Coaches will be able to coach both male and female athletes at the same venue as opposed to having split up their coaching staff and choosing which Masters tournament to attend. Teams will be able to travel together to the same venue reducing the cost of travel. NCS Officials will be condensed to one location at the Masters tournament improving the level of officiating and making it more equitable for female wrestlers. Girls wrestling in particular, will see an increase in visibility to the wrestling community with a combined Divisional and Masters event which will include combined, showcased, finals matches. With the current growth of girls wrestling, adding a Girls Subsection will help create sustainability for the number of entries for a girls Masters tournament. Currently, the size of girls

brackets are unsustainable, possibly even for the upcoming 2023/24 season. Implementation of this proposal will allow for continued growth.

2. Opportunity and Participation - The addition of Divisional Tournaments will provide opportunity for more wrestlers to compete in a NCS post season event. Divisionals will also increase the opportunity for more wrestlers to earn an NCS postseason medal. There are currently 112 NCS medalists in wrestling (8 medalists per weight x 14 weight classes). The addition of 4 Divisionals will increase the total number of NCS postseason medalists in wrestling to 448 (6 medalist per weight x 14 weight classes x 4 divisions + 112 Masters medalists). We believe that the added opportunity to compete in a post season event and earn a NCS medal will provide incentive for wrestlers to stick with and invest more time in a demanding and difficult sport. Student-athletes that may have walked away from the sport in the past will continue to compete and improve. These would also provide balance and more competitive opportunities for a greater number of teams. The possibility of more accolades should theoretically raise the level of competition in every team's wrestling room. The Divisional events, increased medal count, and additional team Divisional Championships will increase the visibility of the sport. This should in turn increase participation as more student-athletes feel they can compete and be successful. This would allow the level of wrestling to increase in each league, which would then affect the quality of wrestling at the NCS Masters Tournament. It would also create fuller teams and help teams retain athletes throughout the season.

3. Accolades - Adding divisionals would increase the strength of wrestling in the section and would make it more relevant and competitive with the stronger sections in the state. We have a large number of schools that have great programs year in and year out with little chance of success past their league tournaments. Without a full team wrestling past the league tournament and into the postseason, these schools can not compete against the schools with full lineups that continue to dominate the NCS Masters tournament. A divisional creates more opportunities for teams to win. We need to create more opportunities for athletes to earn accolades. We need to give coaches and wrestlers a reason to put more time into their sport and create a way to get kids and keep kids out for the team. We need to provide another avenue to build school/team pride and spirit.

4. Alignment - The NCS is currently the only major section that does not have a subsection in wrestling. Parity with CIF Sections across the State-The addition of Divisionals will put the NCS post season in line with other sections around California opening up the possibility of more inter-section participation during the season.

5. Improved Officiating - This proposal would help to allow for quality officiating at our Divisional Qualifiers. The approximately 22 seasoned officials who now work the Masters will be spread equitably over the 4 Divisional events. The divisionals will each be run on 4- 5 mats that would require 6-8 officials per venue. Currently our officiating crews are stretched thin at League Qualifying events which are traditionally both JV and Varsity boys and girls athletes using the same number of mats. The Divisional would be Varsity only, requiring fewer total referees on that weekend. This will allow for our more experienced crews to officiate the Divisionals, which will help decrease controversial calls and match outcomes that have detrimental consequences during Masters seeding. This will ensure that only our best referees are on the mat during the most important matches leading to the NCS Masters Championship.

6. Increased Revenue - There are currently 868 athletes generating revenue for the NCS in the PostSeason. Implementing this proposal would bring that number to 1860. It would also reduce the number of Masters tournaments by one, with the combination of the Boys and Girls event. Additionally, this would save the NCS a significant amount of money.

NCS Play-Offs Proposal
"CCS Model"

Proposal: The proposal put forward today is to have the NCS adopt the CCS model with very few modifications. The CCS model has these advantages:

1. It maintains the size based classifications that protect small schools from large school competition
2. It pulls up 11 schools out of the sized based divisions to play in the Open Division. Last year in BB, the D1, D2, D3 and D4 winners would have been pulled up into Open from both BBB and GBB opening up those Section title opportunities to other size-based schools.
3. It ends the 3-year method of moving smaller schools into larger school classifications. This eliminates the scenario where a school is good for a few years, graduates key players and then has to wait 3 years to move back down to the original level. This move up method is also what is killing larger but not exceptional athletic schools as the competition keeps getting tougher in the larger divisions.
4. Most importantly, it has been in effect in the CCS for 8 years now and it is WORKING in that Section. Most CCS schools/AD's seem to like this model. We do not seem to like our model.

Date of Requested Implementation: 2024-2025 School Year. This gives one calendar year to work out any issues and look at brackets in 23-24 to prep for unintended consequences. We would also then be aligned with the new alignment cycle.

Description of Proposal: (include bylaw revision, if appropriate). Bylaws affected include 510H, 511H and 513H. The Open Division is 8 teams in CCS, but would be 11 teams in NCS since we get more allotted NorCal slots.

NORTH COAST SECTION PLAYOFFS

Sports: Volleyball (VB), Water Polo (WP), Basketball (BSKB), Winter B&G Soccer (Soc), Lacrosse (LAX), Baseball (BSB), Softball (SB). Note we are intentionally omitting Football since it has its own issues and politics. We are using Boys and Girls Basketball as the example sport throughout this proposal. We will need to provide a greater definition on the size of Open Division for non-BB sports which can be done between now and the next SAC meeting in September.

Base Divisions: Traditional NCS enrollment based divisions. For example for basketball:

Petitioning up or down: Per existing NCS guidelines individual schools could petition to move up or down enrollment divisions

Automatic Qualifiers: Per existing NCS guidelines

Hosting: Per existing NCS guidelines

Bracket Development:

Per existing NCS seeding committee guidelines taking into account overall record, league record and place, division record, strength of schedule and head-to-head results. For the purposes of the examples presented with this proposal we exclusively used the MaxPreps rankings for Open selection and Division selection and seeding.

Open Division (maximized to include 11 teams) – The bracket development process begins with selecting the best 11 teams in the Section to play in the Open Division. These teams could be pulled from any of the Base Divisions 1-6. They would be seeded 1-11 and play a traditional bracket to determine a NCS Open Champion. (Note the CCS has recently used a pool play format but with 11 teams a traditional bracket is a better solution). All 11 Open teams would get a NorCal bid which would assure that the NCS's best teams are representing it in the NorCal Tournament.

Divisions 1-6 – The seeding committee would then seed the remaining teams in each Base Division in a bracket with up to 16 teams. The two finalists in each division (1-5) would earn a NorCal bid. Division 6 would continue to receive 4 NorCal bids.

Staggered Brackets in Division Play – The brackets in division play would be staggered with the top seeds getting byes in order to avoid first round blow-outs. See example CCS bracket. This method pits seeds 9 through 16 in the first round, the winners vs seeds 5-8 in the 2nd round, and the winners vs seeds 1 through 4 in the quarters. First week has two rounds and 2nd week has 3 rounds.

NorCal Qualifier Allotment: Per existing guidelines the NCS has 25 bids to NorCals with 4 being tied to D6. Therefore we calculate: 25 bids = 4 (D6) + 10 (D1-5 finalists) + 11 (Open).

See attached examples of breakdown of Open and Division Seeding for boys and girls basketball using MaxPreps rankings only. Note the NCS has not presented enrollment based divisions recently so we tried to recreate them using the footnotes in the posted NCS Divisions.

Rationale in Support of Proposal:

- The current NCS system is not aging well for a couple reasons including all the best teams are being collected into the top divisions which crowds out the opportunity for larger public schools to succeed. Moreover many of the best NCS teams are no longer qualifying for NorCals since the upper divisions have become a mosh pit of the best teams with many of them being eliminated in early rounds. The lower divisions are becoming weaker and insignificant like the NIT or CBIT in college basketball. The NCS's great history of Division Championships is being lost at all levels.

- The CCS has been using its Open model for 8 years with great results that are well received by its members. The power teams are pulled out of the traditional Base Division brackets. The remaining teams compete for historically significant Division Championships and NorCal bids. With the power teams cleared out the remaining teams consistently have a fighting chance and are rewarded with success when they have good teams that play well. The history of CCS Division Champions since the addition of its Open Division is very diverse with public schools of all sizes regularly capturing Division Championships and earning NorCal bids. The CCS's best teams always represent it in NorCals. The CCS eliminated first round blow-outs with its staggered brackets.
- The Open Division is the best version of Competitive Equity because it is based on current success and not past results. So often in the current NCS system teams are moved up based on past success but the reason for that success has graduated and the successor teams are left at a great competitive disadvantage.
- Enrollment size still matters – We have done regression analyses that show enrollment is very significantly correlated to MaxPreps rankings. Also historical results from the NorCal playoffs show small enrollment schools lose very disproportionately in the NorCal's version of competitive equity. Small schools are in a "lose lose" situation in that they are either being moved up to play bigger schools or bigger schools are being moved down. This proposal preserves enrollment being a factor which protects smaller enrollment schools from being at a constant disadvantage.
- Educational outcomes are vitally important to what we are all trying to accomplish with high school sports. For high school sports to be educational hard work and success needs to be rewarded with Championships and NorCal bids. Losing and falling just short is ok and a valuable part of learning too. The State's version of competitive equity punishes success and rewards failure which hurts educational outcomes. As a result it is almost universally disliked by coaches and players. Do not confuse benefitting from the system with liking it. This CCS model proposal strikes the right balance with competitive equity in the form of pulling out the power schools via an Open Division and then allowing the rest of schools to compete for traditional and historically significant Division Championships.

Possible Objections to Proposal:

- Schools with socio-economic disadvantages are likely to still be left behind. That being said this is the case with all play-off systems including the current one. The solution is to adjust enrollments levels down for schools in lower socio-economic areas, but we have not added that to this proposal. It is a big issue and should be addressed on its own. If it is adopted, this proposal still works well with that adjustment.
- Lower Division Relative "Power Teams" could remain even after the top 11 are pulled up to Open. The examples show that Power Teams are being pulled out of all 5 divisions and the CCS history shows this is an infrequent occurrence. But it could happen. No system can guarantee that it can get placement exactly right.
- There is a reduction from 4 to 2 in NorCal slots for divisions 4 and 5. This is balanced by the elimination of the block on D4 or D5 teams being allowed to go to Open. Last year, a D4 team in

each of Boys and Girls BB would have been pulled up to Open had this new system been in place.

Income/Expenses Related to Implementation:

The same number of teams should qualify so this proposal should not increase expenditures. That being said, it should increase ticket sales. Recently League Championship play-offs with rivalries and tradition are outdrawing the NCS and State play-offs that are losing their historical and competitive significance at the lower levels in particular. This model best retains the significance, history and rivalries of NCS Championships and thus should increase fan interest and attendance.

Rationale in Support of Proposal:

The ongoing discussions with SAC committee and the Ad-Hoc committee in 2021-2022 brought several concerns and ideas to the forefront.

- Small schools throughout the NCS do not want a system that does not give them the opportunity to compete in section championships.
- Increasing the number of automatic qualifiers from leagues allows every league to be well represented.
- Hosting for league champions is very important and would remain the same as done currently.
- Competitive Championships are important. Real time brackets could potentially make for more competitive brackets instead of brackets based upon past history.
- CIF qualifiers are important to a majority of our schools.

Possible Objections to Proposal:

- All the reasons in support may also be objections from member schools.

Income/Expenses Related to Implementation:

Since this model would not affect the number of schools participating in the championships, and since games are potentially more competitive, the financial impact, although unknown, could be positive.

Rankings and RPI Options through MaxPreps for Associations

Section 1: Basic Info

MaxPreps can provide associations with custom RPI rankings, MaxPreps Rankings or a modified/customized version of MaxPreps Rankings based on the scores/results input into MaxPreps.

What is important to make Rankings/RPI successful?

Score reporting is essential for an accurate rankings system. Scores would be entered by coaches into the [MaxPreps app](#) or on [MaxPreps.com](#).

What sports are rankings/RPI available for?

Baseball, Basketball, Field Hockey, Football, Ice Hockey, Lacrosse, Soccer, Softball, Volleyball, Water Polo and Girls Flag Football.

Section 2: MaxPreps Rankings

Where are these rankings shown?

These are the computer rankings shown on [MaxPreps.com](#)

How are the rankings calculated?

The system utilizes the huge number of game results stored in MaxPreps across the nation. Generally, the more a team wins, the higher the ranking. However, the system takes into account quality wins (against other highly ranked opponents) and strength of schedule.

For example, a team's ranking is hurt more by losing to a team that is ranked below them than a team ranked ahead.

Playoff wins are weighted higher than regular season games.

Can state associations modify the rankings?

Yes, the following factors can be modified for state association rankings. (The association would need to post the modified rankings to their association website.)

- Margin of victory can be eliminated so all wins are counted equal or can be set at a specific number such as 10.
- The weight of the margin of victory can be increased/decreased
- Forfeited games can be discounted
- Tie games can be discounted
- Tournament games can be discounted
- Out of state games can be discounted
- Playoff games can be discounted
- Playoff games can be weighted higher or the same as regular season games
- The amount of points a team is awarded per win/loss

- Arizona Interscholastic Association uses **modified** MaxPreps rankings for all sports
- Colorado High School Activities Association uses MaxPreps rankings for all sports
- Florida High School Athletic Association **modified** MaxPreps rankings for all sports
- California Interscholastic Federation uses MaxPreps rankings in several Sections
- New Mexico Activities Association uses MaxPreps rankings for all sports
- Idaho High School Activities Association uses MaxPreps rankings for all sports



Section 3: RPI

What is RPI?

RPI, Rating Percentage Index is a statistical system used to comparatively rank teams. RPI is transparent as anyone can calculate the number by looking at standings.

What is the purpose of the RPI?

The purpose of the RPI is to potentially seed teams into region/league and/or state brackets. RPI can be used in a variety of ways such as who makes the postseason, ranking teams that are in the postseason, and/or re-seeding brackets at a certain round within a tournament.

What is the formula* of the RPI?

A sample formula to use is: $RPI = (40\% \times WP) + (40\% \times OWP) + (20\% \times OOWP)$

- WP (Winning Percentage): Divide the number of wins by the number of total games played.
- OWP (Opponents Winning Percentage): Average of the winning percentage of a team's opponents (Note: this is not calculated via the combined record of the opponents, but rather by averaging the winning percentage of the opponents).
- OOWP (Opponents' Opponents Winning Percentage): Same process as OWP except the calculation is with the opponents of the team's opponent.

*The percentages/formula can be changed for the entire association or on a sport-by-sport basis. An association can also choose to use a classification adjustment.

Does the score differential matter in the RPI?

The RPI is based on a win-loss formula. Score differential will have no bearing on the RPI.

What if teams have a different amount of games?

The RPI formula works off the averages of three components: winning percentage, opponents' winning percentage and opponents' opponents winning percentage, so an imbalance of one or two games between teams will have virtually no impact on the ranking system.

Is a team's RPI based on the opponent's record at the time the game is played or is the RPI based on the final regular season record of their opponents?

The final RPI calculations used for seeding purposes will be based on the final records of all teams.

Where would the RPI be posted?

The RPI would be posted on the association website. It would not be shown on MaxPreps.com.

How are games between different classifications counted?

The association can choose to weight games (referred to as a classification adjustment) when teams play up/down a classification.

What other state associations currently use RPI through MaxPreps?

- Colorado High School Activities Association uses RPI for all sports and uses a classification adjustment in football only.
- Florida High School Athletic Association uses RPI in football
- North Carolina High School Athletic Associations uses RPI for all sports
- Utah High School Activities Association uses RPI with a classification adjustment for all sports
- Alaska School Activities Association uses RPI for basketball and are working on other sports

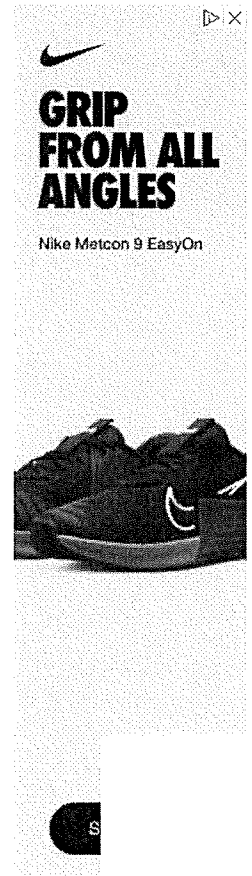

NCS Competitive Equity Proposal - October 2023

This proposal aims to enhance mobility among competitive equity divisions within the North Coast Section. It addresses the challenge of enabling highly competitive teams to ascend the ladder promptly and ensures teams move down the divisions at a more appropriate rate.

Proposed Amendments:

1. Revision of Evaluation Period:

507H Division, C1 - NCS Sports & General Rulings Handbook

We propose a change in the evaluation period from the "most recent three-year period of competition in the NCS Championships" to the "most recent two-year period of competition in the NCS Championships."

2. Adjustment of Competitive Threshold:

507H Divisions, C2 - NCS Sports & General Rulings Handbook

We suggest revising the competitive threshold for division movement from "any team accumulating 24 or more points during a two-year period of competition in the NCS championships or averaging 8.0 or higher during a three-year period of competition in the NCS Championships" to "any team averaging 7.0 or higher during a two-year period of competition in the NCS Championships."

Rationale:

1. Timeliness and Relevance:

This modification ensures a more current and reflective assessment of team performance, taking into account recent developments and changes within the participating teams. Shortening the evaluation period to two years ensures that teams' recent performances are given more weight. This adjustment provides a more current and relevant perspective on a team's competitive prowess.

2. Inclusivity and Fairness:

Lowering the average requirement to 7.0 allows for a more inclusive approach. It acknowledges that a team consistently performing at a high level over a shorter duration is deserving of progression to a higher division. This change maintains a high standard for competitive excellence while allowing for a broader scope of evaluation. This adjustment will also allow for less competitive teams in higher divisions to move down more quickly as teams move up more quickly.

Conclusion:

In summary, these proposed amendments address the need for a more responsive and equitable Competitive Equity Model within the North Coast Section. By incorporating a two-year evaluation period and adjusting the competitive threshold to 7.0, we strike a balance between recognizing consistent excellence and encouraging teams to strive for continuous improvement. It also allows us to maintain a clear, and transparent NCS seeding process.

Scenarios:

Year 1 & year 2 semi-final appearances:

Results in a total of 12 points for an average of 6, teams remains in current competitive division

Year 1 & year 2 with one semifinal and one championship appearance

Results in a total of 16 points for an average of 8, team moves up to a higher competitive division the following year

Year 1 & year 2 with 2 championship appearances

Results in a total of 20 points for an average of 10, team moves up to a higher competitive division the following year

Year 1 - Win NCS Championship

Results in a total of 15 points for an average of 7.5, team moves up to a higher division the following year

*This results in no back-back NCS champions in the same competitive division.

Year 1 - NCS Championship appearance

Results in a total of 10 points for an average of 5, team remains in current competitive division

With this model, more teams would move up each year, and teams would move up more quickly. This model would also create more opportunities for more teams to move down and move down more quickly.

Dear Mr. Cruickshank and NCS/CIF,

As the Director of Athletics, for the Piedmont Unified School District, I am formally submitting our Appeal for the Boys Lacrosse team to remain in Division II for the 2023-24 season.

While our team had a very successful 2023, reaching the Division II NCS Finals, there are several compelling reasons why we would like our team to remain in Division II. Six of our eleven starters were graduating seniors -- including our nationally ranked face-off specialist, our top four point-scorers (who accounted for over 80% of the team's assists and goals), and our defensive captain. While the seniors who graduated had all been playing since elementary school, this season's seven seniors are considerably newer to the sport, with four of them not having started playing until high school, and two having fewer than two years of JV experience only. PHS is a small school (this year's Senior class is 185 students), and the lacrosse program is small (it is unclear if we will have even enough players to field both Varsity and a full JV team this year), so we do not have the same kind of pipeline or steadiness of competitive quality as the larger schools with larger programs that comprise most of Division I.

In addition, we lost our head coach and all of our assistant coaches after last season, and the school has yet to find replacements. All of this is to say, the success of last year's team is not reflective of or predictive of the competitive level of this year's team, and we are really concerned that the boys will just be in for a series of uncompetitive and unfun losses if they are stuck in Division I. Their level is likely to be toward the middle of the pack in Division II, knowing the other programs in the area.

Summary: The council will discuss proposed amendments to the Bylaw which would require schools to postpone or cancel practices and/or competitions due to extreme heat. The changes to the heat illness protocol are due in part to the new requirements of California state law (AB 1653 - Sanchez).

Fiscal Impact: Member schools may incur costs to purchase a Wet Bulb Globe Temperature device and/or additional body temperature cooling mechanisms.

Background: When State statutes are added and/or amended, the CIF has developed corresponding Bylaws to ensure that its member schools are aware of the legislation and comply with its requirements.



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503.K. Heat Illness/**Air Quality Index** Protocol

(1) **Heat Illness**

- a. A student-athlete who exhibits signs of heat illness while participating in, or immediately following, an athletic activity must be removed immediately from participating in a practice or game for the remainder of the day. A student-athlete who has been removed from play after displaying signs and symptoms associated with heat illness may not return to play until the athlete is evaluated by a licensed health care provider and receives written clearance to return to play from that health care provider. On a yearly basis, a Heat Illness information sheet shall be signed and returned by all athletes and the athlete's parent(s)/guardian(s)/caregiver before the athlete's initial practice or competition.
- b. **All CIF member schools must adhere to the CIF Heat Illness Prevention and Heat Acclimatization Policies (see pages - TBD).**

HEAT ILLNESS PREVENTION POLICY FOR THE CALIFORNIA INTERSCHOLASTIC FEDERATION

As per CA State Law AB 1653 and CIF Bylaw 503 K.1. - Heat Illness Protocol, all CIF member schools must adhere to the CIF Heat Illness Prevention Policy as outlined below.

Extreme Heat Procedures:

The WetBulb Globe Temperature (WBGT) is a measure of the heat stress in direct sunlight, which takes into account: temperature, humidity, wind speed, sun angle, and cloud cover (solar radiation). This differs from the Heat Index, which takes into consideration temperature and humidity and is calculated for shady areas. The WBGT is especially valuable in environments where people are physically active, such as sports, as it provides a better assessment of the risk of heat-related conditions during physical exertion. The CIF requires that schools use the WBGT for the most accurate measurement.

Depending on your Category Region (see map below), it is mandated for the benefit of the health and safety of our student-athletes that practice/games be canceled, or delayed until cooler when WBGT exceeds these levels:

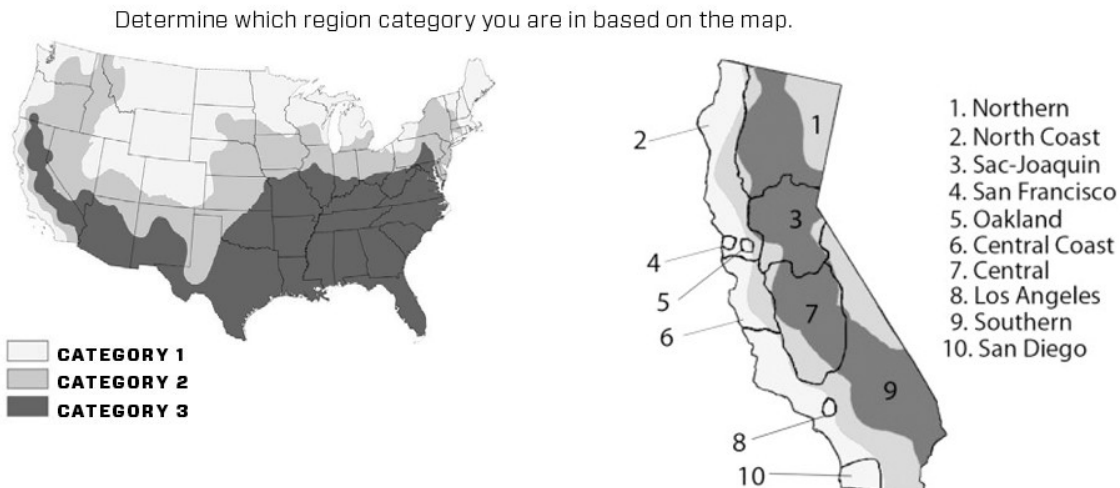
- Region Category 1 >86.2°F
- Region Category 2 >89.9°F
- Region Category 3 >92.0°F

Based on the following map, schools should select the category that best fits their region to follow the required guidelines shown below.

The majority of states fall under just one category or two at the most. However, due to its diverse climate across the state, California encompasses all three categories: light gray - Category 1 / medium gray - Category 2 / dark gray - Category 3. (See image below).

CIF Fall Outdoor Sports Acclimatization Policy

Given the extreme heat issues typically experienced at the start of the Fall sports season, heat acclimatization is crucial for high school athletes to help them adapt to hot weather conditions and reduce the risk of heat-related illnesses. The following is a four-step plan for heat acclimatization in outdoor high school sports:

1. Gradual Increase in Activity:

- Start with light workouts in cooler conditions to prepare athletes for increased heat exposure.
- Gradually increase the intensity and duration of practice sessions over 10-14 days.

2. Hydration Education:

- Teach athletes the importance of staying hydrated and recognizing signs of dehydration.
- Encourage regular water breaks during practice and games and always provide access to water.

3. Modify Practice Schedules:

- Schedule outdoor practices during cooler times, like early morning or late evening.
- Allow frequent breaks and shade to help athletes cool down and recover.

4. Monitor Athlete Health:

- Educate coaches, trainers, and athletes on the signs of heat-related illnesses (heat exhaustion and heat stroke).
- The school will have available a method to institute whole-body cooling to treat a student-athlete with exertional heat illness, especially heat stroke (e.g., ice tub, “taco tarp”, ice towels) which is easily accessible at all practice and contest venues.

Safety should always be the top priority when acclimating high school athletes to hot weather conditions. This plan helps athletes adapt while minimizing the risk of heat-related issues.

For All Outdoor Fall Sports:

Five-Day Acclimatization Period. Preseason practice shall begin with a five-day acclimatization period for all fall outdoor student-athletes. All fall outdoor student-athletes, including those who arrive at preseason practice after the first day of practice, are required to undergo a five-day acclimatization period. The five-day acclimatization period shall be conducted as follows:

- (a) Participants shall not engage in more than one on-field practice per day during the five-day acclimatization period. On-field practices shall last no longer than two hours.

For Football Only

- (b) During the first three days of practice or testing activity, helmets shall be the only protective equipment student-athletes may wear. During the next two days of practice or testing activity, helmets, and shoulder pads shall be the only protective equipment student-athletes may wear. Student-athletes may practice in full pads on the sixth day of practice or testing activity.

Summary: The council will discuss the proposed addition of this Bylaw which would require schools to postpone or cancel practices and/or competitions due to an unhealthy air quality level of 151 or higher.

Fiscal Impact: The only fiscal impact would be if schools choose to purchase an Air Quality Index measurement device for their campus. This is not a requirement for this Bylaw.

Background: Even healthy athletes are at increased risk for inhaling pollutants in the air. Physical activity increases ventilation and the number of pollutants that are inhaled is increased compared to periods of rest. These risks are increased if an athlete has a pre-existing medical condition such as asthma or a cardiac condition.



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503.K.(2) Air Quality Index Protocol

- a. All CIF member schools must refrain from outdoor practice and/or competition when the Air Quality Index is 151 or higher. Schools may use readings for their local area obtained through www.airnow.gov or a measurement device located outdoors on their physical campus.

Q: One of my student-athletes sometimes experiences leg cramps during practices and/or games but then they go away with rest and stretching. Do I have to hold her out from the rest of that practice or game? Does she need to see her physician before she can return to play?

A: Muscle cramps may be an early sign of heat illness and can be evaluated and managed with rest, stretching and oral fluids including electrolyte drinks. If the cramps are not associated with any other signs and symptoms of heat illness and resolved promptly, then the athlete could return to practice or competition and would not require clearance from a licensed healthcare provider. BUT, if any signs and symptoms of heat illness exist alongside heat cramps, then yes, she would need to be cleared by her physician before returning to play. AND, if she continues to experience recurrent muscle cramps, have her see your school's athletic trainer who can evaluate further. If there's no athletic trainer available at your school, your athlete should get a medical evaluation from her physician. Please visit https://cifstate.org/sports-medicine/heat_illness/index for more information on this topic. (Editorial May 2020)

Q: Is there more information available about precautions related to Air Quality Index (AQI)?

A: Yes. Go to the Sports Medicine – Air Quality page at www.cifstate.org for other resources and best practices related to AQI.

Q: What is meant by licensed health care provider?

A: The scope of practice for licensed health care providers and medical professionals is defined by California state statutes. This scope of practice will limit the evaluation to a medical doctor (MD) or doctor of osteopathy (DO).

Q: May nurse practitioners (NP) or physician assistants (PA) provide written clearance to return to play?

A: Yes, a nurse practitioner (NP) or physician assistant (PA) working under the direct supervision of a medical doctor (MD) or doctor of osteopathy (DO) may provide clearance for return to play.

Fiscal Impact: It may be necessary for schools to purchase an additional AED or AEDs to meet device location requirements.

Background: When State statutes are added and/or amended, the CIF has developed corresponding Bylaws to ensure that its member schools are aware of the legislation and comply with its requirements.



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503.L. Emergency Action Plans and AED Protocols

- (1) A school shall ensure that there is a **venue specific** written ~~athletic~~ emergency action plan (**EAP**) **for athletics** in place that describes the ~~locations and procedures to be followed~~ **steps to be taken** in the event of ~~Sudden Cardiac Arrest and other medical emergencies related to the athletic program's activities or events~~ an emergency **related to sudden cardiac arrest and other medical emergencies, including concussion and heat illness**. The school's EAP shall (should) be reviewed annually by pertinent school staff and local EMS providers and be distributed to all athletic department members and healthcare professionals who will provide medical coverage during games, practices, or other events. Each school team (coaches, players, athletic director, etc.) shall rehearse the EAP at least once per season.
- (2) Each school's emergency action plan (EAP) shall:
 - a. list and provide the location of all on-site emergency equipment that may be needed in an emergency situation
 - b. identify personnel and their responsibilities to carry out the plan of action
 - c. include appropriate contact information for EMS
 - d. specify documentation actions that need to be taken post emergency
- (3) The school shall have at least one automated external defibrillator (AED) for the purpose of rendering emergency care or treatment. **The AED(s) should be available for use at each athletic venue within three (3) minutes of a Sudden Cardiac Arrest**. The school shall ensure that the AED(s) are available to **certified** athletic trainers, **healthcare professionals**, coaches and authorized personnel at these activities or events.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Staff is proposing the implementation of a CIF State Boys Volleyball Championship to begin in the 2024-2025 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timeline for implementation of new events for consideration.

Fiscal Impact: The staff has conducted a review of regional boys volleyball events and calculated the budget estimates for State Championship events. This information is included in this proposal (Page 2, #4).

Background: The CIF does not currently have a state championship in Boys Volleyball. This event would bring the top teams from each region to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section and regional championships. It's another opportunity for boys to have state level competition in the sport of volleyball as currently afforded to many other CIF sports participants. This championship event is proposed as a one-day event held one week after the Regional Championship.



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Proposal for California Boys Volleyball Championship New CIF Championship Events

Name of Event: CIF State Boys Volleyball Championships

Proposed Event Dates: The proposed dates of the event coincide with the next available weekend after the completion of regional finals.

Boys Volleyball Schedule Following Regional Championships:

2026: Saturday, May 30: (Regional Championships are Saturday, May 23)

2027: Saturday, May 29: (Regional Championships are Saturday, May 22)

- The CIF State will work with interested host communities to keep championship expenses in line with the projections and use additional marketing opportunities to supplement the budget.

 - This event would bring the top teams from each region to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section and regional championships. It's another opportunity for boys to have "state" level competition in the sport of Volleyball as other sports currently do (Basketball, Volleyball, Football, etc).

Qualifying Participation Criterion for a Regional Championship:

1. **Do 50% of all CIF sections participate in the sport in the same season?**
 - For boys, the SFS, OS, CCS, NCS, SJS, CS, SS, SDS, and LACS all participate in the Spring.

Other Questions:

1. **How will this event benefit participating schools and students?**
 - This event will give boys the opportunity for post-region championship opportunities not currently available in Volleyball.
2. **Do the proposed dates conflict with state mandated testing?**
 - The proposed dates are currently used for playoff opportunities in other sports. No conflict with state testing is anticipated.
3. **Does the event cause additional loss of instructional time? If so, has any thought been given to mitigating this loss (Saturdays, evenings, vacation time)?**
 - The State event will follow a schedule similar to many of the other state level events. Depending on travel, there may be some loss of instructional time, but every effort will be made to minimize lost class time. This event will be scheduled on a Saturday.
4. **How, specifically, will this event be a demonstration of the value of participation in high school athletics?**
 - All CIF events are conducted with the above in mind. This event can give CIF member schools another opportunity to demonstrate that competitions can be played fairly and with great sportsmanship. It is also an additional avenue for our member schools to promote the best values of educational athletics.
5. **Will the proposed event lend itself to a partnership between the State CIF and a CIF Section? If so, the nature of the partnership must be detailed. What are the duties and responsibilities of the State and Section entities?**



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- All duties and responsibilities proposed by the addition of a Boys Volleyball State Championship will be conducted by the CIF state office. The state office will assume financial responsibility of profit and/or loss of the event.
6. Will there be any ancillary activities associated with the event to make it more attractive and reflective of the goals and mission of CIF (i.e., training for coaches, sportsmanship activities for schools)?
- None anticipated.

Proposal Summary: The CIF Staff is proposing replacing the current regional invitational with the implementation of a CIF Traditional Competitive Cheer State Championship to begin in the 2024-2025 school year. This proposal follows the approved State Championships Master Schedule timeline for implementation of new events for consideration. This championship event is proposed as a two-day event (based on registration numbers) held in late January.

Fiscal Impact: The staff has conducted a review of regional traditional competitive cheer events and calculated the budget estimates for State Championship events. This information is included in this proposal (Page 2, #4).

Background: State CIF does not currently have a state championship in Traditional Competitive Cheer. This event would bring teams from all over California to compete in an even larger scale event than their own section championships. It's another opportunity for boys and girls to have "state" level competition in the sport of Traditional Competitive Cheer as other sports currently do (Swim and Dive, Wrestling, Cross Country, etc). The event would allow traditional competitive cheer teams an opportunity to compete at the State level.

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greater excitement in the sport of traditional competitive cheer at the section level and generate additional profit.

- The CIF State will work with interested host communities to keep championship expenses in line with the projections and use additional marketing opportunities to supplement the budget.

Qualifying Participation Criterion for a Regional Championship:

1. Do 50% of all CIF sections participate in the sport in the same season?

- Yes, the SFS, OS, NS, CCS, NCS, SJS, CS, SS, SDS, and LACS all participate in the same season.

Other Questions:

1. How will this event benefit participating schools and students?

- This event will give boys and girls the opportunity for post-region championship opportunities not currently available in Traditional Competitive Cheer.

2. Do the proposed dates conflict with state mandated testing?

- The proposed dates are currently used for playoff opportunities in other sports. No conflict with state testing is anticipated.

3. Does the event cause additional loss of instructional time? If so, has any thought been given to mitigating this loss (Saturdays, evenings, vacation time)?

- The State event will follow a schedule similar to many of the other state level events. Depending on travel, there may be some loss of instructional time, but every effort will be made to minimize lost class time.

4. How, specifically, will this event be a demonstration of the value of participation in high school athletics?



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- All CIF events are conducted with the above in mind. This event can give CIF member schools another opportunity to demonstrate that competitions can be played fairly and with great sportsmanship. It is also an additional avenue for our member schools to promote the best values of educational athletics.
5. **Will the proposed event lend itself to a partnership between the State CIF and a CIF Section? If so, the nature of the partnership must be detailed. What are the duties and responsibilities of the State and Section entities?**
- All duties and responsibilities proposed by the addition of a Traditional Competitive Cheer State Championships will be conducted by the CIF state office. The state office will assume financial responsibility of profit and/or loss of the event.
6. **Will there be any ancillary activities associated with the event to make it more attractive and reflective of the goals and mission of CIF (i.e., training for coaches, sportsmanship activities for schools)?**

Summary: The committee will discuss a proposal to establish a final application deadline for new and renewal multi-school applications. This proposed Bylaw revision would require that all late applications be received by the CIF State Office by the last Friday in September to be considered for that school year.

Fiscal Impact: None

Background: Currently, May 31 of the preceding school year is the due date for new and renewal multi-school applications. Late applications may be submitted until that September 1 with a \$200 late fee. Applications received after September 1 must also include a statement from the school as to the reason for the late application.



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303. MULTI-SCHOOL CIF MEMBERSHIP

- B. (6) New and Renewal applications for multi-school teams under this Bylaw must be filed annually.
- a. **New Applications**
- (i) All new applications must be received in the State Office prior to May 31 of the current school year for approval for the following school year.
 - (ii) All fees must accompany the application and be received prior to May 31. The request will not be considered until the fees are submitted.
 - (iii) Any late applications will be assessed a late fee of \$200; the fee must be attached or the application will not be considered. If a new application is not received by September 1 of the current school year, the school must also submit a statement as to the reason for the late application. This statement must accompany the late application. **All late applications must be received by the CIF State Office by the last Friday in September to be considered for that school year.**
(Approved May 2020 Federated Council)
 - (iv) Students are not eligible to participate or compete with the CIF member school until confirmation from the CIF State Office that the application is approved.
- b. **Renewal Applications**
- (i) All renewal applications must be submitted to the CIF State Office by May 31 of the current school year to continue multi-school status for the following year.
 - (ii) All fees for multi-school dues will be reflected on the invoice sent from the CIF State Office for the school's annual school dues and legal assessment.
 - (iii) Any late applications will be assessed a late fee of \$200; the fee must be attached or the application will not be considered. If an application for renewal is not received by September 1 of the current school year, the school must also submit a statement as to the reason for the late application. This statement must accompany the late application. **All late applications must be received by the CIF State Office by the last Friday in September to be considered for that school year.**
